* denotes a core course for this program. Students must earn a B or higher in core courses. Any student who earns a B- or lower must retake the course in the next semester it is offered, earn a B or higher, or face possible dismissal from the program.

All students must maintain a minimum cumulative grade point average (GPA) of 3.0 or higher. Failure to maintain a 3.0 cumulative GPA will result in academic probation. Students must bring their cumulative GPA to a 3.0 or higher in the subsequent semester. Failure to do so may result in possible dismissal from the program.
